

The dwelling 49 Church Walk still retains its traditional character although a solid planked door is preferred.



The dwellings 3 & 4 Council Houses is one of three blocks of semi detached houses on Church Road. The dwellings are of modern materials and design which are out of character with the traditional buildings in the settlement. Fortunately, several dwellings are still fronted by traditional brick walls.



The Old School Masters House, attached to the former school building Still retains its original charm with an imposing gable end and porch



The rear elevation of 68 Church Walk is spoilt by its modern UVPC porch and windows



The side elevation of Wharf Farm on Station Road has subsequently been rendered which detracts from its original appearance.



The corrugated iron barn at Wharf Farm still shows Shackerstone's rural links with the past



Bridge Farm Cottage has now been absorbed into Wharf Farm. The property still retains its pair of fine chimneys



This derelict building to the rear of Bridge Farm Cottage was once the village bakery. Every effort should be made to retain this vernacular building



The second of two large barns at Wharf Farm fronting Station Road. The area is in urgent need of frontage improvement.

The block of garages and large area of tarmacadam on Station are a poor visual feature and should be replaced with a more appropriate structure.



The field situated between Church Walk and Station Road is used as a children's play area



The earthworks of a motte and bailey on Station Road are a scheduled ancient monument. Excellent views can be seen from Station Road to fishponds, the Ashby Canal and open countryside



The village green flanking Main Street is rented from the Crown Commissioners. The trees on the green are now starting to mature.
