Summary of Issues

Suggest the following amendments are made to Guidance Note 2

- 1. 2.4 Agree with the question but how easily can this be achieved?
- 2. 2.5 It is felt that Mature Areas Definition is at odds with PPG3 and appears to be contradicted by GN2.5. In addition it is felt that the properties to which this applies need to be more accurately depicted, ideally shown on a map. So that they can not be questioned during the application and/or appeal process.

General Comments

- Whilst the publication gives a full and detailed appraisal of the existing
 housing within the area, it is felt that it gives little direction as to the positives
 and negatives to be taken from the existing form, to be used or avoided in
 future development.
- 4. The document and guidance notes are very focused on residential development and lack details on shopping, employment and community uses.
- 5. It seems a shame that the proposed map inserts are not to the same standard as the rest of the publication.
- 6. Page 30 paragraph 3 Character "high quality" areas concerns regarding the use of the term "high quality" with no description of what is meant. Surely we are striving for high quality development in all areas
